Unidentified dead fly infected with the insect-pathogenic fungus *Entomophthora muscae* s.l. (Subphylum Entomophthoromycotina: order Entomophthorales). The fungus has taken over the behavior of the fly just before death and forced it to bite on to the substrate and lift its wings unnaturally away from the abdomen. The fungus can be seen as the white mass growing out from the swollen abdomen where conidiophores are forcibly discharging infective conidia that can infect new flies. Photo: Jens H. Petersen.
